Offered across five regions and delivered over 18 months, the Aboriginal Pathway Program is designed for Aboriginal students to develop the skills they need to successfully complete university study.

The program is open to all people who identify as Aboriginal¹ and can lead to entry into a bachelor's degree at UniSA.

If you're looking for a change in your life, I encourage you to read through this guide. I know it can be daunting when thinking about making that change, especially if you're the first in your family to undertake such a journey.

When I graduated from university, I was not only the first in my family to do so, but I was also the first Aboriginal law graduate in South Australia.

As a Tanganekald Meintangk Boandik woman of the Coorong and the south east of South Australia, I wanted to use my law degree to fight for the land rights and self-determination of First Nations Peoples.

At UniSA, we're committed to creating an environment where Aboriginal students and staff can learn, grow and define the future in a place which respects and learns from Aboriginal knowledge.

I wish you all the best in deciding the path for your future. As one of our first graduates said, "Take that first step. There's a whole world out there. Whatever you want to become or do, it's waiting for you."

APP courses are designed to build the academic skills you need for success at university. You'll learn in a highly supportive environment as you develop foundation knowledge and explore different discipline areas.

FURTHER STUDY

After successfully completing the program, you can use your competitive Grade Point Average (GPA) to transfer into any UniSA or UniSA Online degree. UniSA College provides advice and support throughout this process, and there is no fee to transfer. Explore our wide range of degrees online.

LOCATION

APP is offered in Adelaide at City West Campus, as well as in regional locations, including Mount Gambier, Whyalla, Ceduna and Port Lincoln.

FLEXIBILITY

You can choose to study full-time over 18 months or the part-time equivalent.

To be considered full-time, students must be enrolled in three courses in each six month period.

FEES

There are no tuition fees for this program. You can defer the compulsory student amenities fee via the Federal Government's HECS-HELP loan scheme.

DIRECT ENTRY

There are no formal entry requirements and applications can be made directly through UniSA College.

SKILLS TO HELP YOU SUCCEED

The Aboriginal Pathway Program delivers the skills and knowledge you need to thrive at university.



UNIVERSITY SKILLS COURSES

are at the core of all UniSA College programs, providing you with the reading, writing and research skills needed for university study. These courses will build your understanding of the academic environment and the fundamentals of academic writing, debate and research.

LITERACY COURSES

teach writing and critical thinking skills that will be important to your confidence at university. These include, writing for different audiences, purposes and areas of study.

A NUMERACY COURSE

is included because many university degrees require an understanding of mathematics. In this course, you'll revise existing knowledge and build new skills that will help you with your future studies.

These courses allow you to explore topics of interest and further your knowledge in environmental and cultural areas, while encouraging you to ask questions about the broader world.

PROGRAM DELIVERY

There are nine courses in the Aboriginal Pathway Program. Classes are held from February to November, with study breaks in the first phase of the program aligning with school holidays. In the second phase of the program, classes may be combined with UniSA College's Foundation Studies classes.

TAILORED STUDY LOADS

The Aboriginal Pathway Program has a combination of 8-week and 13-week courses, incorporating both face-to-face classes and online engagement.

The 8-week courses have an intensive delivery of classes held each Tuesday* between 9:00am–5:00pm. The 13-week courses follow the standard university schedule.

*Some intensives may be scheduled on Mondays due to teaching availability.

FLEXIBILITY

Study can be completed full-time over 18 months, or the part-time equivalent. If you're unable to commit to full-time study, you can speak with your Program Director.

INDEPENDENT STUDY

Each course has an expected study load of 7–10 hours of independent study per week. This is in addition to your contact hours (maximum of three days per week). During your independent study, you'll also be able to connect with the Aboriginal Tutorial Program for extra help.

Program delivery explained...

18 months full-time study, or equivalent, available in both Adelaide and regional locations.

Study foundation courses and participate in intensives and weekly tutorials that will prepare you for university study.

Use your competitive Grade Point Average (GPA) to apply for a UniSA or UniSA Online degree of your choice.

Start the first year of your UniSA or UniSA Online degree (competitive entry criteria apply).

Aboriginal Student Engagement Officers from Wurringka.

The dedicated staff will help you navigate the university environment and provide supportive arrangements through culturally-safe study centres and access to the Aboriginal Tutorial Program.
