

It's often said that the eyes are the window to the soul, revealing our thoughts and feelings. Now, new research reveals that your eyes may also be an indicator of your personality type, simply by the way they move.

A study by UniSA researchers in collaboration with international partners is using state-of-the-art machine-learning algorithms to demonstrate a link between personality and eye movements, with findings showing that eye movement can tell whether people are sociable, conscientious, or curious.

The study delivers important insights for social robotics, and its findings could help to improve interaction between humans and machines, making robots and computers more natural and better at interpreting human social signals.

With automation in customer service industries on the rise, in the future these findings could lead to improved personalised services and more authentic interactions with machines.














UniSA College pathways: Foundation Studies

Prerequisites: none Assumed knowledge: none

Study a four-year degree in psychology and graduate with honours. Develop an advanced understanding of critical psychology theory and prepare for a career as a clinical psychologist that can work across a diverse range of settings. Study specialist courses covering areas such as developmental psychology; cognitive psychology; health psychology; work and organisational psychology; language, context and social behaviour; counselling; conservation psychology (the relationship between humans and nature); psychophysiology of sleep; and psychological research. Learn in state-of-the-art facilities located on campus including the Centre for Cognitive and Systems Neuroscience research lab, and a live-in Sleep and Chronobiology Laboratory. Complete a major research project in your final year focusing on a specific area of interest. Take the opportunity to study part of your degree overseas through a study exchange. Graduate with a degree accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and be eligible for membership with the Australian Psychological Society. Continue your studies through the Master of Psychology (Clinical) to become an accredited clinical psychologist.



Develop in-depth knowledge about human behaviour, social services and human resources. Graduate with an understanding of the theoretical basis of psychology, critical and analytical thinking skills, and the ability to manage data and produce ethical research. Choose from a range of specialist psychology elective courses including Psychological Assessment, Psychophysiology of Sleep, Health Psychology, and Work and Organisational Psychology. Gain industry experience through a professional work placement totalling 150 hours in your final year of study. 



Develop a strong understanding of how psychology relates to the human services sector and the skills needed to navigate contemporary issues facing professionals in the field. Explore a range of areas including psychology theory, behavioural sciences, social policy, research and data analysis, and project management. Tailor your studies through specialist psychology courses covering topics such as work and organisational psychology; psychophysiology of sleep; health psychology; psychological assessment; and language, context and social behaviour. Gain practical experience through our human services studios on campus and complete supervised placements during your studies. Graduate with a degree accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and recognised by the Australian Community Workers Association, and be eligible for full membership.

Note 1: Students are required to undertake Criminal History Checks through the Department Note: I. Statistics are required to undertake Chimian Institut Citecks through the Department of Human Services (DHS) for working with Children, in the Aged Care Sector and in Disability Services; obtain a SAPOL National Police Record Check; and complete a one-day Child Safe Environments Course. Some placements may require students to hold a current driver's licence, Mandatory Basic Life Support (BLS) training, vaccinations, or a recognised First Aid Certificate.

Note 2: To become a professional practising or research psychologist, students must continue their studies through a one-year Bachelor of Psychology (Honours) and then a two-year Master of Psychology (Clinical) or Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).



Minimum entry requirements for undergraduate degrees

APPLYING WITH YEAR 12

Applicants are required to have successfully completed the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) with:

- a competitive Selection Rank (ATAR) including adjustment factors: AND
- the fulfilment of the program's prerequisite requirements (where applicable).

Applicants may also be eligible to compete for entry if they have completed the program's prerequisite requirements and have completed one of the following:

- an interstate or overseas qualification considered by the University as equivalent to SACE; or
- the International Baccalaureate Diploma with a minimum score of 24 points.

For some degrees, applicants who have not achieved the Selection Rank (ATAR) required for automatic selection into their preferred degree may be selected for any remaining places based on the grades of their Year 12 subjects.

ADJUSTMENT FACTORS

Universities in South Australia include ATAR-related adjustment factors (previously known as bonus points) for Australian high school students applying for entry into university via the following schemes:

- The Universities Equity Scheme provides additional points for students coming from specified schools, as well as individuals experiencing socio-economic disadvantage.
- The Universities Language, Literacy and Mathematics Adjustment Scheme - provides additional points for students who successfully complete a language other than English, or specified English and Mathematics subjects.

If your Selection Rank (ATAR) or VET award meets the UniSA Guaranteed Entry score for that program, you have met the prerequisites and any other program specific entry requirements, and you have listed the program as your first preference, you are in. It's guaranteed. Please note application timelines may apply.

ADMISSIONS PATHWAYS

Entering your chosen program straight from high school is not the only pathway into UniSA. Applicants may also meet the minimum requirements to apply for entry (via competitive selection) through one of the following:

Higher education study – completion of at least half a year of full-time equivalent study at UniSA or a recognised higher education institution. You can apply using your Grade Point Average (GPA)

Higher education diploma - completion of a higher education diploma from UniSA College (applicable programs listed on each bachelor program in this guide), the South Australian Institute of Business and Technology (SAIBT), or another recognised higher education institution.

Special entry - a competitive Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) score. A personal competencies statement or relevant employment experience may also be considered for some programs

Vocational Education Training (VET) applicants may be eligible for entry with the completion of an award from TAFF or another Registered Training Organisation at AQF Certificate IV or above.

UniSA College – there are a variety of pathway options offered through UniSA College, including diplomas and the Foundation Studies program.

Alternative education providers there are a range of alternative pathways including bridging qualifications offered through SAIBT and Eynesbury.

FEES

All domestic undergraduate students at the University of South Australia are in Commonwealth-supported places. Students in these places pay a contribution of their fees depending on the program chosen and the contribution band in which those courses are classified (see table below). The amount of your student contribution also depends on the unit value of your courses of study.
