Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students who are studying a degree in psychology, social work or human services are able to engage in paid work during their studies through a unique partnership with SYC – a not-for-profit organisation that invests in the community by helping people with housing, education and employment. Students can apply their learnings and gain valuable experience with the possibility of continuing employment after graduation.

NEW WINDOW TO THE SOUL

It's often said that the eyes are the window to the soul, revealing our thoughts and feelings. Now, new research reveals that your eyes may also be an indicator of your personality type, simply by the way they move.

A study by UniSA researchers, in collaboration with international partners, is using state-of-the-art machine-learning algorithms to demonstrate a link between personality and eye movements, with findings showing that eye movement can tell whether people are sociable, conscientious or curious.

The study delivers important insights for social robotics, and its findings could help to improve interaction between humans and machines, making robots and computers more natural and better at interpreting human social signals.

With automation in customer service industries on the rise, these findings could lead to improved personalised services and more authentic interactions with machines.

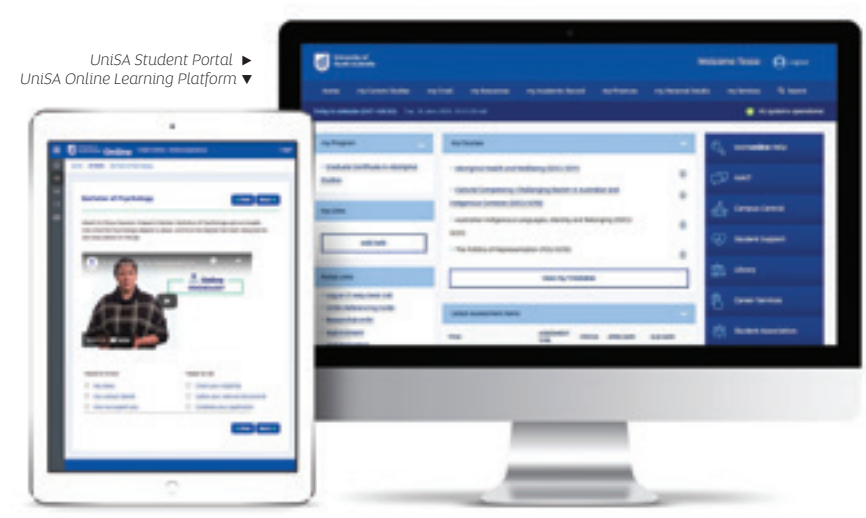

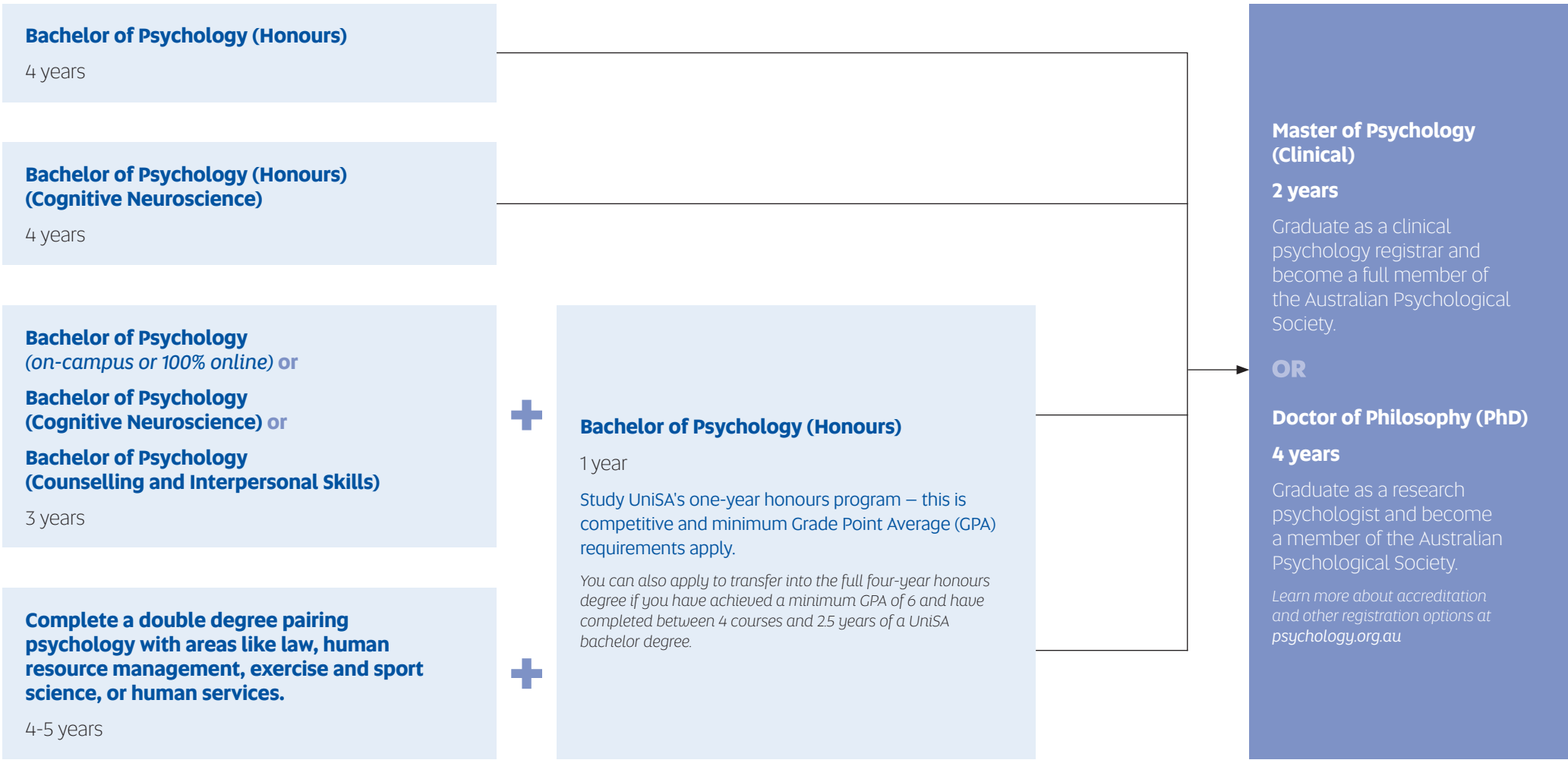

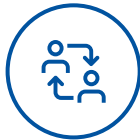

Develop in-depth knowledge about human behaviour, social services and human resources. Graduate with a theoretical understanding of psychology, along with building critical thinking and analytical skills, and the ability to manage data and produce ethical research. Choose from a range of specialist courses that focus on areas like patient assessment, sleep, sport psychology and organisational behaviour to tailor your studies. Gain industry experience through a professional placement totalling 150 hours. Attend classes on campus with the option to study some courses online. Graduate with a degree accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC). Complete further study to become a registered psychologist or research psychologist.

Part-time study available

Study a four-year degree in psychology with honours and prepare for postgraduate studies to become a registered psychologist or research psychologist. Develop an advanced understanding of critical psychology theory and prepare for a career as a registered psychologist that can work across a diverse range of settings. Study specialist courses covering areas such as developmental psychology; cognitive psychology; health psychology; work and organisational psychology; language, context and social behaviour; counselling; conservation psychology (the relationship between humans and nature); psychophysiology of sleep; and psychological research. Learn in state-of-the-art facilities located on campus, including the Cognitive & Systems Neuroscience Research Hub, as well as a live-in Sleep and Chronobiology Laboratory. Complete a major research project in your final year focusing on a specific area of interest. You can also take the opportunity to study part of your degree overseas through a student exchange. Attend classes on campus with the option to study some courses online. Graduate with a degree accredited by the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) and be eligible for membership with the Australian Psychological Society.

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STUDY AT UniSA – THE BASICS

APPLYING WITH YEAR 12 RESULTS

Applicants are required to have successfully completed the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) with:

- A competitive Selection Rank (ATAR + Adjustment Factors);
- Fulfilment of the degree's prerequisite requirements (where applicable).

Applicants may also be eligible to compete for entry if they have completed the degree's prerequisite requirements and one of the following:

- An interstate or overseas qualification considered by the University as equivalent to SACE; or
- The International Baccalaureate Diploma with a minimum score of 24 points.

ADJUSTMENT FACTORS

Australian high school students applying for university study may be eligible for Adjustment Factors (previously known as bonus points). These are based on set equity factors and/or subject choices (see below). SATAC will combine them with your ATAR to improve your Selection Rank for entry.

- The Universities Equity Scheme – provides additional points for students coming from specified schools, as well as individuals experiencing socio-economic disadvantage.
- The Universities Language, Literacy and Mathematics Adjustment Scheme – provides additional points for students who successfully complete a language other than English, or specified English and Mathematics subjects.

GUARANTEED ENTRY

There are a few ways to guarantee your place at UniSA:

Year 12 Grades Guaranteed Entry – UniSA offers guaranteed entry based on your three best Year 12 subject grades for most degrees. If you achieve the selection grades and you put us as your first preference, that's it, you're automatically in.

Subjects need to be 20-credit Stage 2 Tertiary Admission Subjects (TAS). Students also need to achieve a minimum ATAR of 50.

Selection Rank Guaranteed Entry – UniSA has set guaranteed entry scores for most of our degrees. This means, that if you achieve that set Selection Rank and you put us as your first preference, you're in. There's nothing more you have to do.

Some degrees also have prerequisites and other eligibility criteria for entry that you'll still have to meet. Application timelines and fees also apply.

TAFE/VET Guaranteed Entry – UniSA offers guaranteed entry based on successfully completed VET qualifications. If your completed VET award meets the set VET Guaranteed Entry, you have met any prerequisites and specific entry requirements, and you've listed the degree as your first preference, you're guaranteed an offer.

ALTERNATIVE PATHWAYS

Entering your chosen degree straight from high school is not the only pathway into UniSA. Applicants may also meet the minimum requirements to apply for entry (via competitive selection) through one of the following:

UniSA College – there are a variety of pathway options offered through UniSA College, including diplomas, Foundation Studies and the Aboriginal Pathway Program.

STAT – a competitive Special Tertiary Admissions Test (STAT) score, based on 70 multiple choice questions designed to assess your aptitude for tertiary study. A personal competencies statement or relevant employment experience alongside your STAT score may also be considered for some degrees.

TAFE/VET – applicants may be eligible for entry with the completion of an award from TAFE or another Registered Training Organisation at AQF Certificate IV or higher.

Tertiary transfer – completion of at least half a year of full-time equivalent study at a recognised higher education institution. You can apply using your competitive Grade Point Average (GPA).

SAIBT – There are a range of bridging qualifications offered through the South Australian Institute of Business & Technology.

FEES

All domestic undergraduate students at UniSA are in Commonwealth-supported places.
